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25 things you probably didn't know about the Mini

- At one stage the Mini was going to be called the Austin Normarket.
- After just three years of production the 500,000th Mini rolled of the production line.
- 3. At the peak of production the Mini used 2.4 million wheel nute a year.
- The record for cramming people into a Mini was 66i it happened on Noel Edmonds Late Late Breakfast show in 1986.
- If you parked all the Minie ever made end-to-end they would etretch from London to Sydney, Australia, 10.568 miles away.
- 6. There are 115 Mini clube in Britain, 80 in Germany and 1 in Croatia.
- 7. The total production of Minie exceeds 5,270,000 and is rising.
- 8. Joanne Weetlake was the first person to be born in a Mini.
- 9. Niki Laudo's first racing success was in a Mini Cooper an a hillclimb.
- And the late James Hunt's first over racing car was a Mini in 1966.
- The first Mini off the production line ever made registration 621 AOK can now be seen at Gaydon's Heritage Museum
- A year after ite launch an average of 400 Minie were being produced at Longbridge, while the night shift made 180.
- The price of a Mini in 1959 when launched was equal to \$728.42 of today's dollars including tax.
- There have been 26 special and limited editions the first was in 1976.
- There was no heater available as standard on Minis in 1959, but it was available as an option.
- It has been claimed the Mini was the cause of the collapse of the British motorcycle industry.
- Deelgner Alec leelgonie failed hie math exame three times at Hattoreca Technical College.
- The Twini Mini with an engine at both ende created a 2.5 litre car with 175bhp.
- 19. The best year for sales was 1971 at 318,475 care.
- Peter Sellere' Radford Mini that appeared in the Pink Panther film featured a wicker pattern with 2,000 hand painted lines.
- In 1959 the Longbridge assembly line was 220 yards long. It took just over two hours to build each car:




John Wohlelagel took a well-deserved best in marque trophy for the Mini's -- good job Johnil

CAR SHOW



Although it has been quite some time since our visit to the Automotive Museum, I thought it deserved a big plug in our little magazine.

The musuem itself is full of suprises -- I will not reveal these surprises in this little blurb -- suffice to say that it is unlike any other automotiver museum the I have visited.

The staff was extremely nice to us and treated us to what amounted to the grand tour! We even got to meet the director of the museum (who once owned a mini -- hasn't everyone??) and he spent some time dicussing the museum and its philosophy.

We were told that at least 80 percent of the cars were "on loan" and are all scheduled to move on and be replaced with other vehicles. This means that you could probably plan a visit about 3 or 4 times a year without going over the same vehicles.

The first floor of the musuem is dedicated to documenting the automobile and its relationship with Southern California living. The second floor is a showcase for race and classic cars and the third floor is dedicated to "sutomobile art".

Those that went were all very impressed with the layout and cars on display and everyone said that they had never seen an automotive display quite like it. So if you wish to be pleasently surprised and life to peruse customs -- hot rods -- classics -- and race cars, then this is definitley the place for you. So here it is, and please pass it on to someone clee or run a few copies.... I paid for it; now you may have it for free.

(Recipe may be halved)

- 2 Cupe butter
- 4 Cupe flour
- 2 Top. sods
- 2 Cupe eugar
- 5 Cupe Hended oatmeal**
- 24 Oz. chocolate chips
- 2 Cupe brown euger
- 1 Top. oalt
- 4 Egge
- 1 BOz Herehey bar (grated)
- 3 Cupe chopped nute (your choice)
- 2 Tep. baking powder
- 2 Tep. vanilla

Cream the butter with both eugare. Add eggs and vanilla; mix together with flour, oatmeal, salt, baking powder, and soda. Add chocolate chips, Hershey bar, and nuts.

Roll into balle and place two inches apart on a cookie sheet. Bake for 10 minutes at 375 degrees. Makes 112 cookies.
